### Piper & Carson Hayes

From festival stages to intimate house concerts, Piper & Carson remind us of why we go to see live music. Their song writing is free and fiercely personal; as if it's been running in the woods, washing in cold water, and howling with wolves. The couples undeniable chemistry and onstage presence draws the audience into the conversation. Piper's immersive storytelling provides context and familiarity bringing their original music to life. After first meeting on Carson's father's organic vegetable farm, they've spent the last five years touring Turtle Island coast-to-coast, showcasing at international Folk Conferences, touring overseas to the Netherlands and the Edinburgh Fringe Festival. October 23, 2020 marked the official release of "a wonderful new recording "Edgewalker's Remedy" - a concept album specifically designed to provoke reflection about our lives and what we all take for granted." - Jan Hall, Folk Roots Radio, which comes after their critically acclaimed 2017 release 'Piper & Carson'. Their work is deeply rooted in intention and both strive to use their platform to forward social change. This duo will make you believe that folk music can change the world.

#### Heather Beamish

Heather is a tea-drinking, female-loving, ex-evangelical pastor turned spoken word artist, activist and educator. Heather recognizes that throughout history differences have divided, isolated and disrupted our connection with each other. In her work she prioritizes resourcing communities with tools for rebuilding, reimagining and reconciling those differences.

Heather is excited to co-create vibrant, inclusive community spaces where the faces, stories and needs of those who are Queer, Black, and Indigenous (BIPOC), along with allies who are committed to the work, are centred and celebrated. In her talks, you will encounter themes that speak to the variety of intersections that she lives out of every day. ### Jeffrey Straker

Singer-songwriter pianist Jeffery Straker grew up taking piano lessons in small-town Saskatchewan. He actually swears he was born under the piano on the family farm, and since those 'grand' beginnings he's gone on to perform over 100 shows per year across Canada, Europe and Latin America. The storytelling nature of his roots-folk songs has the power to transport a listener – out onto a lake in Canada's North or to the main street of a prairie town. A clever lyricist with an energetic piano style his song writing has drawn critical comparisons to the likes of Harry Chapin, Kris Kristofferson & Billy Joel and the Chicago Free Press has written:

"Rufus Wainwright, as well as k.d. lang are among the Canadians making essential and beautiful music. Add the name Jeffery Straker to that list."

Straker's 2017 album "Dirt Road Confessional" reached #5 on the iTunes Canada singer-songwriter charts. It saw him debut at Canada's National Arts Centre and perform live on BBC Radio in the UK. His songs have been licensed for film, TV and theatrical productions and he's performed his music in sold-out shows with symphony orchestras. The recipient of a Western Canadian Music Award in 2019, he also received the Saskatchewan Music Award for Roots/Folk Artist of the Year in 2020 and the Saskatchewan Country Music Award for Keyboard Player of the Year in 2021. Jeffery has just released his brand new ten-song recording "Just Before Sunrise" and his 'Pandemic Piano' tour will see him make 50 stops this summer performing his new music. Michael Shewburg is the Executive Director of Five Oaks Centre, an intercultural centre for retreat, education and healing. Michael worked with local municipalities, farm owners, public health and arriving temporary foreign workers to establish a migrant worker care program during the COVID-19 pandemic. Five Oaks has since then housed over 550 workers for their 14-day isolation care and 130 workers in long term care.

#### Catherine Arcand-Pinette

A professional classical singer, Catherine Arcand-Pinette is a well respected Oakville vocal teacher, clinician and adjudicator. A graduate of the Masters In Performance and Literacy Program at Western University, she has enjoyed a diverse musical career from exploring her love of Early Music through the ensemble Musikay, to performing throughout Southern Ontario as a part of the jazz trio, Trio Bella, to singing Broadway favourites in recital, to performing in the cover band "Tonight's Band". Catherine is currently the Voice Department Specialist and co-director of the Enriched Voice Program at the Merriam School of music where she has taught for the last 21 years. At St. Paul's United Church in Oakville, Ontario, she has previously led the Youth Choir, GLOW, as well as the Worship Band and is now the Director of Music in charge of all Sunday music including the Adult Choir. Catherine believes that her job as the Director of Music is to facilitate the congregation's ability to experience a profound and spiritual connection to the divine through music, and she strives to accomplish this each week by accessing her love of diverse musical styles and making intentional choices. #### Kimberlee Walker - Co-writer/Show Facilitator

Kimberlee Walker is a social worker, actor, and Applied Theatre facilitator. After graduating from the University of Waterloo's Peace and Conflict Studies program with a Drama minor, Kimberlee became a founding member of Theatre of the Beat in 2011 and has been involved in the company in some way ever since. She performed in nearly all of the company's major touring productions; selected credits include the roles of Sue Steiner in Gadfly, Robyn in Forgiven/Forgotten, and Alex in This Will Lead to Dancing. After receiving a Master's of Social Work degree from Wilfrid Laurier University, Kimberlee developed TOTB's "Restorative Justice Theatre Program" at Grand Valley Institution for Women. This program marks the first time that a professional theatre company has collaborated with federally incarcerated women in Canada, and has been the subject of a recent academic publication. Kimberlee is passionate about using the arts as a tool for personal and social change, and is thankful to have many opportunities to do so. In addition to her theatrical pursuits with TOTB, Kimberlee has held a number of social work positions and now works as a therapist at Transformation Counselling. Frances Loiselle is an actor/ theatre artist currently based in Toronto.
